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KATIE OHE RECOGNIZED BY THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

Katie Ohe, a Springbank resident since 1973, was recently awarded the 2019 Alberta Order of Excellence, the highest honour to be bestowed upon an Albertan citizen. Katie also recently received the 2019 Lieutenant Governor of Alberta's Most Distinguished Artist Award. Both honors recognize Katie as one of the most prolific and innovative artists Alberta has ever produced. A renowned Canadian sculptor, Katie is the first artist to make abstract sculpture in Alberta. Her work has been commissioned and exhibited across Canada, as well as internationally. Her art is included in important collections, including those of the Canada Council Art Bank, the Alberta Foundation for the Arts, the Shell Collection, The University of Calgary, and the Glenbow Museum. Beginning in 1970, she has taught sculpture at the Alberta College of Art + Design (now the Alberta University of the Arts). Many of the students she

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mentored over the years have become successful artists who have attained international recognition. Katie is also the object of several momentous arts exhibitions that took place in 2019. Her art will be featured in the Esker Foundation exhibition that will be held in January of 2020. This exhibition includes the most comprehensive survey and presentation of her work to date.

The awards noted above also recognize Katie's generous and tireless human spirit. She and her artist husband, Harry Kiyooka, set up the Kiyooka Ohe Arts Centre (KOAC) in 2010. They donated their land (20 acres off of Horizon View Road in Springbank), their home, studios, arts library and their art collection, plus a generous endowment fund, to the KOAC. The Arts Centre currently holds over 100 indoor and outdoor pieces in its collection, however KOAC does not currently retain the capacity to show all of them. KOAC's sculpture park has the potential to be the largest of its kind in Western Canada, as well as a cultural destination and economic generator for Springbank and the Greater Calgary Region. One of KOAC's goals is to preserve Calgary's cultural heritage by honoring the large-size works of famous sculptors. The KOAC site is being carefully developed by local landscape architect (and KOAC Board Member) Len Novak, so it maximizes the presence of artworks in a natural setting while encouraging viewers to wander through the grounds. As the installation of new artworks progresses, the KOAC site will continue to evolve into an arts destination that is accessible by everyone, regardless of their level of education and social background. "We often think of

art viewing as an indoor experience, moving through museums and galleries to experience painting and sculpture. But some of the best art can be seen blended with nature," said Novak.

As part of its legacy, a priority for KOAC is to protect 10 acres of Aspen, Birch and first growth forests located on the site. This area is being preserved and retained as a green corridor and woods sanctuary. During summer months, KOAC visitors can stroll along designed walkways that meander through the botanic garden and the sculpture park.

Working on a project by project basis, KOAC partners with the Springbank community to come together through art, a central tenet of KOAC mandate. Katie says KOAC wants to encourage everyone to see that there is no "wrong" way to look at art. "We want the general public to enjoy art," she says. "It doesn't require special education, only the fun and the pleasure that lies in applying our imagination." Last summer, KOAC hosted a group of teenagers from different Alberta locations during a four-day workshop. In 2020, KOAC will be working with local schools under the guidance of local art teachers and KOAC artists in residence to hold workshops that will bring the creative process to classrooms in conjunction with providing students with opportunities to visit the artists' studios.

SPRINGBANK COMMUNITY HIGH SCHOOL PHOENIX ALUMNI STUDENTS CELEBRATE UNIVERSITY OF CALGARY DINOS' NATIONAL CIAU UNIVERSITY FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Three Former SCHS Football Players on Winning Dinos Team

The U of C Dinos won the Vanier Cup in convincing fashion, with a 27 to 13 victory over the Montreal Carabins in Quebec City on Saturday, November 23rd. This great victory for the Dinos, the highest achievement in Canadian university football, is also a victory for the Springbank community. Numerous players from the Springbank area have played for the Dinos over the years. Most of these players have been trained by dedicated coaches from the Junior Phoenix Program and Springbank Community High School.

The 2019 Dinos' journey to the Vanier Cup was challenging and rewarding, as the team completed the regular season with a 6 win and 2 loss record. Injuries loomed large during the regular season, as many senior starting players were out of the lineup for various games. These setbacks made the team stronger and more unified

going into the playoffs. The Dinos met the University of Manitoba Bisons in their 1st playoff game, which ended in a very close 47 to 46 victory for the Dinos. The Dinos then advanced to the Hardy Cup (Western Division Championship) for the 12th consecutive year, where they defeated the University of Saskatchewan Huskies by a score of 29 to 4. The Dinos were now Western Division Champions and the team was firing on all cylinders! To emphasize team spirit and to unify the players, they all dyed their hair blonde. Now the Dinos were a highly spirited and unified team of players with bizarre hair colours, ranging from platinum blonde to brassy yellow. They were now "all in" and together for the long haul! One player was quoted saying, "If we lose now, we will all look silly with these crazy hair colours."

The Dinos punched their ticket to the Vanier Cup



National Championship game with a decisive 30 to 17 victory over McMaster University in the National Semi-Final Mitchell Bowl. Now the Dinos were in the Vanier Cup National Championship game! This was the 5th time in the past 10 years the Dinos qualified to play in the Vanier Cup, a real testimony to the consistency and high caliber of the team during this decade. The Dinos' 2019 Vanier Cup victory was the team's first CIAU Canadian University Football Championship in 24 years (i.e. since 1995).

This year's national champion Dinos team included three players from Springbank, brothers Daniel and Nate Teitz, along with Scott MacDonell. Micah Teitz, a former Dino and Springbank Phoenix player who formerly played for the Dinos and now plays in the Canadian Football League (CFL) with the Saskatchewan Roughriders, was able to celebrate the victory with his brothers. Springbank resident and a former Dinos and Calgary Stampeders quarterback Andrew Buckley served as the Dinos quarterback coach for this season's team, so he was able to celebrate the championship with his fellow coaches as well as with the players.

The U of C Dinos' national championship should be shared with the coaching staff of the Springbank Community High School's and Junior Phoenix's football teams. Phoenix football coaches have consistently developed players who are highly skilled, able to play football at the university level, and win national championships. The players always have fun playing on the two Springbank football teams as they represent the Springbank community. Maybe all of the rarified pure air that blows over the mountains into Springbank gives the Phoenix's players and coaches the "extra edge" that serves them so very well on the football field!

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
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A Fair Deal for Alberta

Alberta needs a fair deal from our federation, and it is my honour to be granted the opportunity to fight for it.

Lately the lack of national unity spreading across our country and how a deserving Alberta can properly fit back in to greater Canada has been weighing heavily on my heart.

Prior to the federal election, our United Conservative provincial government proactively undertook the task of legislating a self-reliant Alberta to the best of our ability, so as to fireproof ourselves regardless of what election results were to be realized. We repealed the carbon tax, took measures to incentive Alberta-based job creation, and filed a constitutional challenge against the no-more-pipelines Bill C-69. Still, our recent polling numbers indicate that roughly 30% of Albertans across the province of all ages, genders, geographic locations, and backgrounds support separation. That is why I am incredibly honoured to have been recently appointed to Alberta's Fair Deal Panel by our Premier, Jason Kenney. I will be one of only three government MLAs chosen to sit on the Panel and have the honour of working alongside greats like including Preston Manning and Donna Kennedy-Glans as we discuss and strategize this government's next steps towards building a formidable Alberta.

For the next three months our Panel will travel across Alberta and host what will likely be widely attended townhalls to discuss the merits and public interest of the many ideas contained in the 2001 firewall letter, including but not limited to: collecting our own taxes, creating a provincial pension plan, establishing a provincial police force, appointing a Chief Firearms Officer, enshrining our own Albertan Constitution, and equalization reform. At the completion of the tour, our Panel will then author an extensive report detailing our findings and recommendations of how Alberta shall proceed on our path to independence and prosperity within Canada.

Our government and the many Albertans we represent have had enough with Ottawa's absolute indiffer-

ence towards our adversity, and enough with Ottawa's ambivalence towards our world-leading energy and agricultural industries. With the formation of this Panel, our United Conservative Government is promising you that we are committed to bold action backed by extensive public consultation. The times where our province is forced to sit idly by and let the rest of Canada decide our fate are over. It is time we take matters into our own hands and build an Alberta - and a Canada - that works for everyone, not just those living on the other coast. We are all frustrated with the state of our federation, but that does not mean we should outrightly give up on our federation. It means we must fight for it, and it is my honour to be one of the few to be spearheading the charge.

Townhalls will be scheduled for Calgary, Edmonton, Lloydminster, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Grande Prairie, and Red Deer. Additional meetings in rural communities will be also announced in the coming weeks.

Municipal Planning Commission

Council is most of the way to establishing a Municipal Planning Commission (MPC). Administration delivered background information at the September 24th Council Meeting (their report is included in the Meeting

Agenda). At the November 26th Council Meeting, we passed third reading of Bylaw C-7967, as amended. This did not require a public hearing. What remains is to modify the Land Use Bylaw (LUB) to permit use of the new Commission. This will require a public hearing, which should take place early next year.

A municipality may establish a MPC and prescribe in the bylaw the Commission's functions and duties including, but not limited to, subdivision and development authority powers and duties. The MPC can be strictly advisory, or it can be given development authority.

A MPC that is strictly advisory could be valuable where there are benefits to being completely arms-length, and also where there are substantial complex, novel, or divisive planning policy questions to be explored with much public input. That said, Rocky View County (RVC) is choosing the full authority option, and has carefully considered the terms of reference. The Commission will consist solely of the nine Councillors. Council is firmly integrating the Commission into our governance framework (e.g. LUB).

A MPC usually proves valuable in relieving Administration from making politically sensitive decisions. It ensures discretion in development authority decision making is exercised by a panel rather than individual administrative personnel. However, it has the potential to add to the time required to make decisions. There may also be a feeling that a panel is less subject to bias.

Bias and Planning Decisions

Bias in planning decisions can result in decisions being overturned in the courts at great expense to the municipality. People elected to Council often come with strong

views on issues that matter to the community. However, strong views can become problematic when they prevent a Councillor from considering the views of others.

The Municipal Government Act's (MGA) Code of Conduct Regulation requires the Council's code to at a minimum include such matters as representing the municipality, respecting the decision-making process, and adherence to policies, procedures and bylaws. Further protecting taxpayers, the MGA allows complaints to be made to the Alberta Ombudsman to determine whether a municipality has acted fairly and reasonably, and also whether decisions were consistent with relevant policies, procedures and legislation.

Planning documents and policies that have been approved by Council are valid until amended. MPC members must adhere to adopted policies and plans when carrying out their planning duties, even if these policies run counter to their own views or contradict their election platforms. It is also important that Councillors demonstrate a willingness to consider a broad range of views on planning issues.

To help achieve this, Councillors must distinguish their role on Council from their role on a Municipal Planning Commission:

Councillors are elected to represent the views of their constituents and strong opinions are to be expected. But, Councillors must be careful when meeting with their constituents and when speaking at Council to ensure they do not show an unwillingness to consider the opinions of others, or demonstrate a "closed mind", or "an expression of a final opinion on a matter that cannot be dislodged".

When a Councillor is acting as a member of a Municipal Planning Commission, the test for bias is much stricter. Here, bias is determined on the basis of whether a reasonable observer identifies impartiality.

Hopefully this background will allow you to assess your County's performance as we move towards fully implementing our new Municipal Planning Commission.

The girls then built momentum as they won their next 4 matches to finish 2nd in their round robin pool, which secured the team a playoff spot in the quarter finals. On the final day of the Provincials, the girls won their quarter finals match against Crescent Heights from

Medicine Hat. The team then advanced to the semi finals to play the tournament favorite, Peace Wapiti Academy from Grande Prairie. Springbank won again, which earned the team a place in the Provincial final for a rematch against Edmonton Christian. Springbank lost the 1st set and then dug really deep to battle back and win the 2nd set, forcing a 3rd and deciding set. Springbank took the lead, 13-11 before Kyla Raessler's served a ball that caught the top of the net and rolled in for the 14th point. Her next serve was mishandled by the opponents, and Springbank earned the 15th and match winning point. The girls all started celebrating their championship victory together. What a way for the team to cap off an outstanding season!

The Springbank Senior girls had a very special team this season. The team carried 15 girls on the roster and every player played and made a difference! If one player was struggling, another stepped in to play very well. The bond shared between all of the girls was so very strong! The girls were led by team captain, Grace Coulter, who continually made huge power plays. Sarah Zonneveld also made many big setting plays, while Kyla Raessler contributed numerous crucial serves and blocks. This team was also special because the coaches were able to bring any player into a game knowing she would make a difference.

COME SKATE OR CURL AT SPFAS DURING THE HOLIDAY SEASON

Have Fun at SPFAS – Times Available for Free Public Facility Use & Private Facility Rentals

This is the 4th consecutive year SPFAS will have the Outdoor Rink (ODR) with a refrigerated ice system available to the general public during the Christmas – New Year's season.

Go to the SPFAS webpage at <http://springbankpark.com/index.php/facilities/outdoor-rink.html> to obtain information regarding times and dates when the ODR will be open for free public shinny (with sticks and pucks permitted) and free public skating (skates only) during the holiday season from December 20th to January 3rd. The adjacent Fieldhouse will also be open when the ODR is available for public shinny or skating sessions. Be sure to share the ODR with others (play together, no bullying, share the ice). Be respectful of the ODR and Fieldhouse (keep them clean, no alcohol/smoking/vaping/cannabis). Be safe (use your judgement re wearing protective equipment, shooting pucks, skating with speed). And abide by the Outdoor Rink's Code of Conduct (posted in the Fieldhouse and at the ODR).

SPFAS is also planning to have ice times available during the holiday season for free indoor public shinny and skating, as well as for free public curling. And SPFAS can make times available during the holiday season when families and individuals can rent one of the two indoor arenas, or the curling rink, for private uses. 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

Bow River Dam Process (Glenbow East):

Thank you to everyone that attended our information night October 23, 2019. In less than one month, we collected just under 700 letters of concern which were delivered to Alberta Environment and Parks (AEP).

We recently met with AEP to discuss, in more detail, our comments regarding the Glenbow East Dam option on the Bow River. These included: destruction of six stewardship parks, damage and loss of trails and pathways, loss of existing infrastructure, devaluation of real estate in Bears paw and Springbank, loss of views and property to transmission lines, environmental degradation to shoreline and loss of wildlife corridors and wetlands, loss of historical and cultural sites, loss of economic opportunities due to lost recreation and river access, no upstream flood mitigation, and potential impacts to water co-ops. This map highlights the impacted lands which run from Cochrane to Calgary.

For more specifics around these concerns please visit our website at springbankcommunity.com.

AEP is wrapping up the Conceptual Assessment phase of the process by March, 2020, and will be moving forward to conduct Feasibility Studies on all three of their options, including the expanded Ghost Lake and Morley Reservoirs. The Feasibility Study process will take some time - 2 to 3 years. In the mean time, we have asked AEP to host an information session with affected landowners so that they know their rights and obligations during this process.

We will continue to monitor this project for the community & report back. Although the public comment period is closed, AEP staff were open to receiving public input at aep.bowbasin@gov.ab.ca.

One reason many Springbank folks did not receive information pamphlets from AEP in the fall was due to old addresses still showing on your land title. If you have lived in your home for a long time, it is likely that your mailing address is out of date at land titles. If you did not receive information from AEP,

we encourage you to go check your address at a registry office so that you receive communications in the future. Some 300 mail-outs were returned to AEP.





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SPRINGBANK JUNIOR PHOENIX FOOTBALL TEAM'S SEASON REVIEW

RURAL CRIME WATCH TIPS

We all continually work to make Springbank a great community. One way Rural Crime Watch strives to do so is by deterring thieves who compromise the safety and peacefulness of our community.

Deliveries Bring Both Convenience And Consternation

Many consumers want companies to deliver purchased products directly to their residences. Thieves will follow a delivery vehicle and then pick up packages left at a door or a driveway gate. What can you do? You have options. Ask the delivery vehicle's driver to have someone sign for a package. Arrange for an individual to be at the drop off location when a package is delivered. Arrange for a package to be delivered to a business, or a post office box address, instead of to a residence. Buy an item at a store. These are all better alternatives than dealing with situations when thieves have stolen delivered packages from unattended residences.

Looking After Neighbours Who Are Away

We all enjoy time away on vacation. Residences where nobody is home are potentially greater targets for thieves. They do not want to be seen, identified or caught. When we help our neighbours, we help our community. Examples of how you can watch out for a neighbour who is away include communicating in advance of a departure date so you know when a house is unoccupied, picking up parcels left at doors, removing snow from a driveway, parking a vehicle in a driveway, checking the inside and outside of a residence (including switching lights on and off) and having your neighbour's emergency contact information available. Help your neighbour by making an unoccupied residence look like someone is actually at home. Good neighbours take turns looking out for each other.

Distracted Driving Epidemic

Distracted driving is generally defined as any diversion of an individual's attention while that person is driving a vehicle, usually due to a driver focusing on an object,



activity, event, or person instead of solely on driving. Distracted driving is comparable to impaired driving with regards to creating dangerous situations for a vehicle's driver and passengers, as well as for others on the road. Distracted driving causes many serious accidents. Enforcement and fines to deter distracted driving are increasing in order to reflect the seriousness of this offence and its

threat to public safety. Some insurance companies are adding premium surcharges to insurance policies, or are refusing to provide insurance coverage, to those who have distracted driving offences on their driving record. Along with setting examples for others, we can increase our own personal safety and the general public's safety, by:

Informing distracted drivers we see to stop this dangerous driving practice immediately

Reporting drivers we see who are using cell phones when they are driving vehicles


Leaving our cell phones off and inaccessible and promoting safe 'smart' phone use when we are driving.

A STORY OF CHARACTER: HEROS AND EDGE SCHOOL FEMALE PREP HOCKEY

For Carla MacLeod, character development and community engagement are part of the DNA of her teams. After winning a gold medal as a member of the 2006 Canadian Women's Olympic Hockey Team (she won another gold medal in 2010), Carla had many opportunities to become involved in community initiatives. She embraced volunteering and was inspired by the positive impact she could have by giving back.

When she became Head Coach of Edge School's Female Prep Hockey Team in 2014, it was important for Carla to share volunteer and community service opportunities with her players. She had been involved with the Hockey Education Reaching Out Society (HEROS) in the past and a partnership with HEROS and her Edge team seemed like a great fit.

A volunteer driven charity, HEROS uses the game of ice hockey to teach life skills and empower marginalized youth. Working with HEROS Executive Director,


This investment has certainly helped dozens of youth in the HEROS program over the past five years. The impact on Edge students and alumni is also profound.

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


MEN'S SPORTSMAN BONSPIEL
